








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


Maintain the boat and safety equipment – Why?

- What are the consequences of lack of maintenance?
 - Things break not good when out on the water!
 - Things leak not good when out on the water.
 - Things run out running out of fuel is not good.
 - Ropes & Lashings replace when required.
 - Batteries need to be charged.
- What about safety equipment?
 - Empty fire extinguishers
 - Life jackets that don't fit
 - First aid kit empty or missing
- What equipment should I have on this boat?
 - Check the emergency plan..
 - Where is it stowed?

Rules:

Read this notice and take notice of the location of equipment

Remember that there is no hot water...

The window from the cockpit to the fordeck must be shut when running above idle and fordeck is not to be occupied when underway.

No wet or damp items are to be stowed in the berth area.

Refrain from using the toilet except in an emergency, and if you do, you must tell the skipper who shall ensure pumpout and tank flushing.

Remember, this boat consumes 37ltr/hr at 20knot cruising speed and 60ltrs/hr plus when running at 35knots or towing tow toys or skiers

We also have the 3-person inflatable banana tow toy and the 2.5m inflatable tender with solar powered electric outboard, as well as the 2.9m x 2.26m inflatable floating pad.

The bimini of the boat has an IISOW Solar Array for feeding the LSkW 240VAC Inverter as well as forward the bimini has LEO lightbar flood/spot, rear anchor light and swim platform worklights.





Launching:

Ok this boat is on a dry store at Marmong Point Marina and the crew use a big forklift to place it in the water.



We have fenders to stop bumping against the seawall and use Lines to bollards to secure the boat to the dock.

Remember that whist a car steers from the front, a boat steers from the back (*stern*) (unless fitted with bowthrusters which we don't have)

Remember wind and tide – these will both act on the boat and push it about. You need to work with it...

On a boat this size, try and get a helper and as skipper – it's Your responsibility to make sure that they know what is expected of them and you are required to keep them safe!

How about a trailer?

If you're launching from a trailer – here's some pointers Make your backing up anticlockwise curves, not clockwise. *That way you can see out the side the back of the trailer.*

Make sure a line is attached when you take off the restraints Don't know how many time I've seen boats float off..

Have a decent weight on the traction wheels of the tow vehicle especially important when retrieving or you'll just spin the wheels & make smoke

Float the boat off once the wheels are semi-submerged

Clear the ramp promptly for the next launching.





Trip Planning:

Tell me what the weather forecast is for today?

How did you check it?

Have you checked that the boat is suitable to take you safely to where you're going?

How many occupants can the boat carry? Is there enough safety equipment for them (correct size lifejackets)?

Have you got water to drink, food to eat, sunscreen, etc.

Who have you told where you are going and who shall any emergency responder call? When did you say you'd be back? When you get back, what do you do?

Make your own checklist...



Towing:

The safety of the vessel towing is the priority.

Ensure that you can quickly release the towline if There is danger to the towing vessel by the tow.

Suggest use either a "slip bowline" or a "draw hitch" as well as have the observer with Ready access to cut the towline.

You must have an "observer" when towing anything!



My Checklist

Before going boating, fill out a copy of this float plan (or similar) and leave it with a *reliable* person whom you can depend on to contact the Marine Rescue or other the authorities, if you do not return as scheduled.






Both powered vessels move to starboard (right).




The yellow powered vessel gives way to the red powered vessel by going behind it.



The red sailing vessel gives way to the yellow sailing vessel by either going behind or changing tack to go the other way.








Keep to starboard (right) side in channels and take extra care at bends.








Divers can be up to 100m from their float or flag.

A swimming area extends 60m from the shore between signs for swimmers.








knots or more, keep at least 30 m clear of other vessels, land or structures.


Slow down and minimise your wash







You must keep a minimum distance from other vessels and people in the water.






Port marks (red) define one side of the channel. They have a canshaped topmark or buoy. If lit, they display a flashing red light. Starboard marks (green) define the other side of the channel. They have a cone (triangle) topmark or buoy. If lit, they display a flashing green light.









Understanding navigation buoys, marks and lights helps you safely navigate a waterway.

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Any vessel up to 50m long at anchor.



Powerboat or sailing boat using its engine up to 50m long coming towards you.



Sound signals		Meaning
1 short blast	•	I'm altering course to starboard (right)
2 short blasts	••	I'm altering course to port (left)
3 short blasts	•••	I'm operating engines astern (stopping, slowing or reversing)
5 short blasts	••••	I'm unsure of your intentions and I doubt whether you're taking sufficient action to avoid collision.
1 long blast		I'm nearing a blind bend and you might not be able to see me.







If someone's in the water near the propeller — turn the engine off! Remember soggy clothes add considerable weight when hauling a clothed victim into your boat.
